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Commentary

Driving Prices Up

- Almond Hulls are now extremely hard to come by on the open market. Processing disruptions and contract balances have led to a shortage of available product.
 Some farmers have had contracts paused for 6 to 8 weeks while suppliers work through the shortage.
- Continued dry conditions have increased demand for fibre replacement products both in Western Victoria, but this has now also started in Gippsland with silage inventories now starting to run low in areas that have previously not been in the market. Hay supplies are dwindling, which is further increasing demand.
- Lack of agistment or available feed for young stock has also increased demand beyond what we would expect at this time of the year.

Driving Prices Down

- The AUD has increased to 64 cents USD, underpinning protein such as Soy and keeping starch prices at current levels.
- Cashflow is tight and tightening on most dairy farms, with farms now considering selling off cows, rather than purchasing more feed. Stock water supplies are also dwindling in some of the rainfed regions and purchasing both water and feed in feasible for even medium term.
- Global Corn prices remain subdued, and this is translating in Australia, keeping starch prices at reasonable prices.

Local News

- Cotton Harvest is well underway as far south as Tocumwal, with excellent yields reported. Ginning is underway and supply should normalise this month.
- Widespread rain has been welcomed in the Western part of Victoria, from Hamilton to Swan Hill. Patchy falls have been reported, with up 60mm falling in areas. This is welcome news for Sothern Mallee and Wimmera croppers getting some much needed moisture to sew into.
